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FROM THE BOARD PRESIDENT

Region 6 Behavioral Healthcare (Region 6) is the largest of Nebraska's six regional Behavioral Health Authorities, and is comprised of Cass, Dodge, Douglas, Sarpy, and Washington counties, located in eastern Nebraska. Region 6 receives county, state, and federal funds and operates through a contract with the Department of Health and Human Services System's Division of Behavioral Health (DBH). This structure allows for a unique partnership between county, state, and federal governments, county residents, and community organizations and as a result, over 17,000 service encounters were provided to individuals in need of behavioral health services in Fiscal Year (FY) 2021.

The world-wide COVID-19 pandemic was a significant experience for many Region 6 consumers, providers, and staff duirng fiscal year 2021. In partnership with DBH and service providers, Region 6 was able to ensure that behavioral health providers were able to smoothly and safely continue the transition from the delivery of in-person services to telehealth services as the virus continued to impact consumers' mental health and the provision and delivery of services.

Despite the unprecedented challenges experienced in FY21, Region 6 was able to meet the behavioral health needs of the residents of Cass, Dodge, Douglas, Sarpy, and Washington Counties through innovative and creative responses. This could not have been done without the strong partnerships with our provider network and the commitment from our community stakeholders. We appreciate the dedicated efforts of the Regional Governing Board, the Behavioral Health Advisory Committee, the Consumer Advisory Team, our communities, providers and coalitions, and our valued employees for their support and commitment to building a healthy Nebraska by delivering an effective public behavioral health system.


NETWORK SERVICES



Services include community based services, rehabilitative services, residential substance abuse services, and psychiatric services. We provide comprehensive and systemic planning, organizing, and monitoring of the services provided to consumers in the public behavioral health system. The Region also serves as an advocate for consumers and the behavioral health system as a whole.




Key Service Outcomes


The outcomes highlighted below are reported quarterly and are focused on the time from contact to admission, the percentage of consumers showing an improvement in function as a result of services, the percentage of substance use disorders consumers who saw a reduction or no increase in substance use while in service, and the percentage of consumers who had no more than one psyciatric hospitalization during the quarter.













CONSUMER OUTCOMES

Consumer-reported performance indicators are measured through consumer surveys using a 5-point Likert scale questions at time of discharge, except indicator 3, which is asked after admission.

In June 2020, Region 6 developed a crisis counseling program consisting of a team of 12 crisis counselors to provide virtual behavioral health outreach to individuals and communities impacted by the COVID - 19 pandemic through funding from the Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA).




CAFAS Score Reduction

Significant Reduction at Time of Discharge




Remain In Home

Caregivers Who Reported No Out-of-Home Placements Following Discharge




Timely Access to Services

Families Who Reported Timely Access to Services






Needs Met

A National Initiative to Reduce the Number of People with Mental Illnesses in Jails

CRIMINAL JUSTICE & BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

Stepping Up is a data-driven initiative designed to create systems-level change to reduce the number of individuals with serious mental illness in jails. The initiative urges county leaders to review current practices and to adopt policies, programs and practices that impact the following 4 key measures.

2021 Accomplishments


Cass, Douglas, Sarpy and Washington Counties all passed proclamations showing their support and commitment to the Stepping Up initiative. Douglas and Sarpy Counties both maintained their "Innovator County" designation for work with gathering accurate and accessible data on the prevalence of people in their jails who have a serious mental illness. "Innovator Counties" have demonstrated their ability to use data to understand the scale of the problem and to better connect these individuals with the services and supports they need. Other FY 2021 accomplishments include:

- The Douglas County Familiar Faces pilot demonstrates a measurable impact on reducing jail days and decreasing recidivism for those with a serious mental illness who frequent the jail.
- Sarpy County implemented the Specialized Transition Planning (STP) pilot which provides case management to individuals with a serious mental illness while they are in jail and after release.
- The Washington county jail implemented the Brief Jail Mental Health Screen (BJMHS), a validated and standardized brief screening tool to identify those who may need further mental health assessment.
- Sarpy County jail hired a practicum student graduate to conduct reentry planning for individuals with high needs.
- Douglas and Sarpy County Stepping Up teams continued to meet virtually and focus on the Stepping Up 4 Key Measures throughout the Covid 19 Pandemic.


